The course is based on many cases from the International Criminal Court to provide a greater understanding of the application of the law of armed conflict at the practical level in the contemporary operating environment.

The main objective of the course is to provide the students with knowledge, skills and values necessary to use the fundamental principles and rules of international humanitarian law and to demonstrate the ability to apply them in the context of different operational cases.
